
Every film begins with the script. Knowing the basics of writing a screenplay can set you on the right path.




Cheryl Stapp is an award-winning writer-historian who has published six nonfiction books on California's vibrant past; two published



Typically, with time for about six writers, the 7:00 to 8:30 pm event has provided not only casual writer-to-writer interaction, but insight and entertainment for all participants. Members gain insight about the work of other members, as well as their writing inspirations and goals.


The pieces read are expected to be self-contained, such as a chapter or a little story. However, those are not limitations. A vivid description of a character, event, scene, or essay is also welcome. We have not yet had a screenplay piece. The Moderator, John Patterson, requests each author submit a brief introduction of the author and/or the piece to be read. The reading time limitation runs about 6-8 minutes. All readers are encouraged to practice reading their piece out loud (which is slower-takes more time-than reading to yourself).

Writers who've signed up will receive additional information from John about two weeks prior to the event. Those who come to listen are reminded to consider the reader's needs: thus no use of chats; big physical movements; eating; talking; etc. during the actual readings. John will open the event at 6:30 pm for visiting. Please plan to arrive before 7:00 pm. If you link in during a reading, the moderator may wait until the end of the reading to admit you.

Tips for the Writer:

Information You Wish You Had Known in the Beginning of Your Writing Experience

- 1. Read Stephen King's book, On Writing, and Mark Levine's on The Fine Print of Self-Publishing!
- 2. Write what you love. For me, it is the fairy tale.
- 3. When writing your first draft, write with total abandon! Don't worry about crossing t's, etc. Get in the zone!
- 4. Invest in heavy-duty, high-quality editing.
- 5. Read your written copy aloud, especially the dialogue. Check for flow and smoothness.


- 6. Join a critique group! If one doesn't work for you, try another.
- 7. Keep in mind, a book **IS** judged by its cover. Aim for an eye-catching jacket. Make sure your interior is also effective, one that works well with the overall look of your book.
- 8. Carefully, select your publisher. Don't wait for that one- in-a -million book deal. Consider self-publishing! Self-published books **ARE** accepted at your local bookstore.
- 9. Promote your book whenever you can and get others to help you. Advertise on social media!

Things I Wish I would Have Known When I Started Writing – A Partial List

- ✓ Writing is 1/3 talent, 1/3 perseverance, and 1/3 studied craft. Yes, studied craft!
- ✓ In anything you write, know what you want to say. Everything should support that quest. Avoid distractions, even if you love them.
- ✓ It's okay to spend money on yourself as a writer. Clubs provide camaraderie and support, while long-term process/generative writing sessions (input, discussion, reading, discussion, etc.) have the potential to provide deep and lasting writing improvement. Many community colleges offer classes where lessons are delivered, readings are examined, and classmates' writing is "workshopped."
- ✓ We learn how to bring a piece of writing to life through scenes, reflection, and summary, organized in just the right order to hit the reader emotionally.
- ✓ Read writer's magazines and understand publishing trends.
- ✓ Don't assume that the reader wants to hear about your experience if you're writing memoir. No matter how traumatic the experience, the way the story is told has to bring the reader in and not let him/her go. This is the job of the writer learning how to do it successfully.
- ✓ Writing requires a thick skin. We tend to feel protective of our writing, but we have to get over it.
- ✓ Input is most helpful from readers who know how to put a story together and also use literary devices such as setting, dialogue, and pacing. Avoid relatives and close friends for input.
- ✓ Learn how to write a pitch/query letter and/or a book proposal.
- ✓ Editors and agents are busy. They are inundated by queries and pitches. Most pitches and queries are not particularly good or not appropriate for their publication/area of specialization.
- ✓ Follow the careers of writers you like. Also, look into their agents and publishers.
- ✓ Never say never. There are many commonalities among genres. Skills used in one genre can be applied to others, and may take you down exciting new paths you never expected!



Aimee Nezhukumatathil was born in 1974 in Chicago to a Filipina mother and Malayali Indian father, Aimee Nezhukumatathil is known for writing poems that sit at the intersection of three cultures: Filipino, Indian, and American. She received her BA in English and MFA in poetry and creative nonfiction from Ohio State University in Columbus. Nezhukumatathil is the author of four poetry collections and an essay collection World of Wonders (Milkweed Editions, 2020), a New York Times bestseller and Barnes and Noble's Book of the Year. Her awards include the Charles Angoff Award from The Literary *Review*, the James Boatwright III Prize from Shenandoah, the Richard Hugo Prize from *Poetry Northwest*, and several fellowships. She is professor of English and Creative Writing at the University of Mississippi and lives with her family in Oxford, Mississippi.
