Karl Henwood, a writer slogging it out in the trenches, is putting on a <u>free</u> range day for interested writers. It will teach basic firearm safety and operations, as well as familiarize them with several types of firearms common in fiction.

This event is for any writer (at any point in their writing career) or writing-adjacent person (agent, editor, etc.) who is interested in a basic familiarization with a variety of firearms, or anyone who is already familiar but wants some practice.

Some hands-on familiarity with both early and late-model weapons will be provided. Ammo for the provided weapons, lunch, shooting location, and water at the range are included.
