Narrative Authority comes from our sense that the writer is fearless and in control of the story they're telling. We will look at text by several authors to see what they're doing that creates the power of voice, and discuss why and how the text is working. Using visual prompts, we'll write two short pieces and share them, attempting to identify the sound of our own voices.

- To understand narrative authority and voice in fiction and/or memoir writing.
- To understand the power and uniqueness of your own authenticity.
- To examine the text of successful writing to learn what a strong voice can do.
- To discover more about your own voice through prompted writing and discussion.
- To consider the precision of language, and language's power to create.

Molly teaches creative writing at Mendocino College. She works as an editor, writing coach and workshop facilitator. Her debut novel, *Requiem for the Author of Frankenstein*, was nominated for the Northern California Book Award in Fiction and won the Independent Publishers Book of the Year Award and an Indie Book Award for Historical Fiction. She's founding president of the Writers of the Mendocino Coast, a branch of CWC.

Point of View Workshop

Mark your calendars to come on out to the <u>Avid Reader Bookstore</u> 617 2nd Street, Davis on **Wednesday**, **February 28**, **from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.**, to hone your skills and increase your knowledge related to **point of view (POV)**, that essential topic for fiction writers.

CWC Sacramento members <u>Judith Starkston</u> (author of *Hand of Fire*, *Priestess of Ishana*, *Sorcery in Alpara*, *Of Kings & Griffins*) and <u>Tim Schooley</u> (author of *The Wool Translator*) will share their tactics for bringing readers deeply into the POV of their characters, an essential skill for increasing your readers' emotional response to your words by feeling what your characters feel.

The course is designed for both novice and experienced writers, and will cover: POVs used by contemporary authors, statistics about the use of various POVs today, when and how to avoid head-hopping, how to choose the "correct" POV for you, writing multiple POVs in one novel or story, and the all-important topic: writing in "deep" or "close" POV. The course will include exercises to help you stretch your POV wings.

Although there is no charge for the class, Avid Reader asks that attendees buy one of either author's books at the store on the evening of the program. Come out to enjoy an evening with fellow writers while studying some of the more challenging skills in fiction writing.

Every year, the SFWC offers 2 scholarships to each branch of the CWC.

- 1) The <u>Poetry Summit</u> is held on Saturday February 17th at 9am. This full day event has a standalone value of \$249. There is also a Poetry and Jazz evening event.
- 2) The Writing for Hollywood summit is on Friday February 16th at 9am. This is also a full day event; the details can be <u>found here</u>. You may also get access to the Wine and Book tasting event at 7:30pm.

Both summits have a standalone value of \$249. Cost is waived for Recipients of the scholarships. Attendees must provide their own transport. We may reimburse reasonable travel expenses subject to approval by the board.

- Seminars are day-long—expected to be 9-5. The scholarship <u>does not</u> include lunch. Recipients should either bring a bag lunch or avail themselves of many nearby lunch locations.
