CWC Press announces two releases for the summer of 2024: Best of the Best: 2024Literary Review and Vision & Verse, A Fusion of Art, Photography, Prose and Poetry. Both books feature CWC members' literary and visual art and will be offered in electronic format as a member benefit.

Mike Apodaca (High Desert), Jenny Margotta (High Desert), Elisabeth Tuck (Mt. Diablo), Joyce Krieg (Central Coast), Roger Lubeck (Redwood), and the High Desert team have been working hard to bring you the Best of the Best: 2024 Literary Review by the California Writers Club. The Best of the Best is 383 pages with 68 pieces (half prose and half poetry). These works are from members in 17 branches. Each branch was able to choose the best prose and poetry from its members. The number accepted for each branch was based on the number of members; one prose and one poem per each 50 members in a branch. 










Writing for the Inspirational Market

Learn how writing inspirational books can encourage, help, and equip readers so they experience hope and real personal transformation.

Janet McHenry is a speaker and the author of 27 traditionally published books—including the bestselling <u>PrayerWalk</u> and her newest, <u>Looking Up!</u> A journalism graduate of UC Berkeley and a writing coach, she teaches at writers' conferences around the country and hosts the Sierra Valley Writers Retreat twice a year.

Often described as a life juggler, upon graduation with a degree in journalism from the University of California, Berkeley, Janet McHenry worked as a newspaper reporter and high school English teacher while raising four kids with her high school sweetheart husband Craig (aka The Rancher).

She is a writer, speaker, life and <u>Advanced Writers and Speakers</u>
<u>Association</u> Certified Coach as well as the founder of the <u>Sierra</u>
<u>Valley Writers Retreat</u>.

At school, our teachers often encouraged us to write about what we did on our holidays. I would like to persuade you all to write something creative that can inspire us all.

I don't know how this will work, but I am open to suggestions. For instance, having a single story in our newsletter may create unnecessary rivalry. Perhaps it would be better to have stories published and stored on our website.

Wimbledon July 2024

"Tennis is the perfect combination of violent action taking place in an atmosphere of Tranquility." *Billie Jean King*. Winner of 39 Grand Slam Titles!

WTF! How many? Proof that women should not be trifled with.

I visited Wimbledon in July 2024. Primarily. It is a private tennis club in London, UK, with about 500 members. The cost of membership is, if anything, underpriced, but it requires strict regulation.

Wimbledon makes squillions of dollars every year through national and international championships. It is one of the four top Grand Slam Tennis events as defined by the International Tennis Federation (ITF). The French Open, The American Open, the Australian Open and, of course, Wimbledon. The name alone strikes awe.

All the others either use hard courts or clay. Wimbledon is the only one that uses grass. This is not a trivial task, as each court needs to be raised and prepared for each year's game. Even the length of the grass has a strict definition, requiring it to be exactly 8 millimeters.

Experienced grounds persons are not just growers of grass who make sure the lawn is level and aligned for players. They even understand the depth of root and the crowding of grass per square inch. They abide by (and probably defined) a strict science determined by the ITF. Such definitions can and will influence the behavior of tennis balls in a match, and each match on each court must be equivalent.

If you know lawn tennis, then you know Wimbledon. Game, set and match! "You cannot be serious!"

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE (CONTINUED)


Such quotes reflect the weight on the souls and behavior of players. Preparing your life for world class competition builds your body, but can only place stress on your life. As a tourist, I wept in sympathy for these players. I also learned of the respect, friendship and bonding between some competitors.

On the stage, people may behave differently than in private life.

There is something that we all can learn from this. We all need to understand our art. We all want to be a shining success, showing the world how great we are. To achieve such heights, we may sometimes behave mis-appropriately. Deep down we are just ourselves, simple human beings, prone to error, but striving for success.


May I wish you success.



MIEMIBIER PROFILE: SHIRLEY PARENTEAU by Kimberly Edwards

Listen, Learn, and Improve Your Writing





Shirley Parenteau

How and when did your interest in writing begin?

When my husband and I moved from Salem, Oregon, to Elk Grove in 1961, the only published writer I knew was my mother. She subscribed to *Author & Journalist*, a magazine I pored over. By 1963, I had published a brief article in a small magazine and three short stories. When I read in *The Writer* of a California Writers Club conference coming up at Mills College in Oakland, I gathered my courage and attended. There I met published Sacramento authors who urged me to attend dinner meetings in a Sacramento restaurant and critique meetings then held once a month in members' homes. The friendship and encouragement my new friends offered became invaluable.

What training helped you improve your writing?

I've attended many writer's conferences since that first one at Mills, learning from fellow writers as well as from fascinating speakers. Writing styles change and we need to stay aware of that. A picture book I sold when my children were young, a book that won a Children's Choice award, would be far too wordy for today's market.

What in your writing career are you most proud of?

I'm most proud of my first Candlewick picture book, <u>Bears on Chairs</u>. It's simple while urging readers to share through the natural bouncy rhythm of the story. This book has been printed in translation in many countries. It's especially popular in Japan where merchandising rights have sold so that the bears have appeared on house slippers, teacher's smocks, a gift set of bear and toddler-sized book, as well as other items.

What type of reading do you do when not writing?

Currently, I'm reading a series of science-fiction and fantasy novels. I prefer reading fiction, but have acquired a library of books on various types of writing. Particularly useful is <u>The Emotion Thesaurus</u> by Angela Ackerman and Becca Puglisi. This amazing cliche-avoiding thesaurus lists physical and mental reactions to a large number of emotions your characters may be feeling.

What words of encouragement would you give to new writers?

Writing often leads to rejection, no matter how many books we've sold. We need to develop a tough skin, close those rejections in a file somewhere, understand that story criticism is not meant to be personal and if that one can't be saved, to move on to the next project. For years, I was in a group of multiply-published novelists. Their comments could feel brutal. I kept thinking I would never return to the group, but I always went back because once the sting wore off, I realized those hard-hitting comments would improve my writing. I do urge writers to critique gently, especially with new authors, but while praise is nice, where writing is concerned, well-meant criticism is more helpful.

Shirley Parenteau was raised on the Northern Oregon Coast where her father logged and her mother wrote freelance articles for Portland newspapers. Shirley's writing career began with articles for travel magazines. She then moved into children's books, then to novels for <u>Ballantine Books</u> and for Harlequin Historical. She returned to children's books with a sale of (so far) nine titles in a picture book series beginning with <u>Bears on Chairs</u>, illustrated by artist David Walker and published by <u>Candlewick Press</u>. Candlewick also printed her three-book Friendship Doll series for readers from ages seven to twelve, based on a little-known 1926 doll exchange between American and Japanese children. Shirley's three submissions have been accepted by the CWC 2024 Ekphrastic Book, <u>Vision and Verse</u>, to be printed later this summer.

The other towards the Sky.







